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CHAS. O'CONNOR HENNESSY MEMORIAL MEETING TO BE HELD DECEMBER 11th

NEW YORK CITY (HGNS) - A meeting to honor the memory of Charles O'Connor Hennessy, statesman, indefatigable worker for land value taxation and world peace, trustee of the Robert Schalkenbach Foundation and friend and supporter of the Henry George School of Social Science will be held at School Headquarters, 211 West 79th Street, on Friday evening, December 11, 1936, at 8.15 o'clock, under the joint sponsorship of the Trustees of the Robert Schalkenbach Foundation and the Henry George School of Social Science.

Invitations have been issued by the Arrangement Committee on which Henry G. Atkinson, Anna George de Mille and Leonard T. Recker are serving, to friends and associates of Mr. Hennessy who worked with him in the movement, as owing to the limitations of space only a small group can be accommodated. Philip H. Cornick, Frederic C. Leubuscher and Lawson Purdy will be the speakers of the evening.

LANCASTER M. GREENE TO ADDRESS TROY'S FIRST GRADUATING CLASS

TROY, N.Y. (HGNS) - Lancaster M. Greene, faculty member and a trustee of the Henry George School of Social Science will address Troy's first graduating class at the Troy Club on Tuesday, December 1, 1936. Other speakers on the program will be Gilbert M. Tucker of Albany, author of "The Path to Prosperity" and Edward Jerome of Schenectady, author of "Governments and Money."

Warren S. Blauvelt, manager of the Hudson Valley Coal & Coke Co. is the instructor and he has announced that two classes will be started late in January.

The new alumni propose to form a local chapter of the Henry George Fellowship and organization plans are under way.

SCHOOL AND FELLOWSHIP EXHIBITS FEATURED AT CINCINNATI CONGRESS

CINCINNATI, OHIO (HGNS) - A feature of the Eleventh Congress was a series of exhibits portraying graphically the founding of the School, its extension work and the varied activities of the alumni groups growing out of the New York Chapter of the Henry George Fellowship, prepared by Robert Clancy, an instructor at National Headquarters and chairman of the Art Committee and the Library Committee.

A photograph of the late Oscar H. Geiger, founder of the School, was mounted on a board, together with a Teacher's Manual, samples of the circular material used in organization work by the School and its extension system and a complete assortment of classroom helps, illustrating the development of the teaching method endorsed by the school and prescribed for its extensions.

Another display arranged by Edward W. Bell, chairman of the Committee on Publications, was made up of a selection of clippings of news items, editorials and readers' letters from the national press, turned over to the committee by the Robert Schalkenbach Foundation to handle as seems most fitting, along with some pertinent replies made by members of Mr. Bell's committee.

There were also a series of releases of the Henry George News Service, which issues weekly bulletins of Georgist world events to fifty four publications on both hemispheres, subscribing to the principals of land value taxation, world peace and free trade, and a collection

of Fellowship papers, among them the New Standard published by the Writer's Group of the New York Chapter and the Henry George Fellowship News of Chicago.

Don Luis, a graduate of the Middletown, N.Y. Extension contributed two charts which outlined the laws of the distribution of wealth and Valery P. Damionof, chairman of the Research Committee of the New York Chapter submitted a number of charts showing the distribution of wealth in the United States.

Another exhibit consisted of the works of Henry George published by the Robert Schalkenbach Foundation and George Raymond Geiger's latest book, the "Land Question in History." Also on display were Gilbert Tucker's "Path to Prosperity," Emil O. Jorgenson's "Stagnation of Industry," "Chain the War God," by Col. Victor A. Rule "No Taxes" and "The Forum" published by L.D. Beckwith of Stockton, California, and the literature of the Sales Tax Repeal Association of California.

A "little red schoolhouse," a model of the traditional little red school house of song and story, called the Henry George School of Social Science and bearing an inscription soliciting daily contributions played a conspicuous part among the exhibits. It was designed by James C. Fuller, graduate and sponsor of the Kansas City Extension and will be used in a drive to raise funds for local and national school extension promotion. Thirteen hundred of these "little red school houses" were placed before the Congress closed.

COURT REFUSES TO REINSTATE MAYOR MC NAIR

PITTSBURGH, PA. (HGNS) - The Court of Common Pleas ruled on Nov. 17th that Mayor William N. McNair "resigned beyond recall," and holds that he has no claim to the office he relinquished on October 6. The three judges handed down a unanimous decision fully sustaining the contention of Cornelius D. Scully that he had been duly and regularly elected by the City Council to the vacancy created by McNair's resignation. Mayor McNair has declared he believed he could work more effectively for the Georgist movement as a private citizen. Mayor Scully is a member of the directorate of the Henry George Foundation.

"SOCIAL PROBLEMS" ISSUED IN SPAIN

MADRID, SPAIN (HGNS) - Only a few months before the revolt of the Right in Spain carried the fighting to this city a new edition of the Spanish translation of Henry George's "Social Problems" was published here. New interest had been aroused in the book, which analyzes precisely the economic and social forces moving toward chaos and dictatorship in modern monopolistic society, by the acute development of conditions in the country.

The edition was carefully translated by Baldomero Argente del Castillo, and appeared with a preface written by him, La Reforma Social, monthly journal of the Georgist League of Spain, reports. Mr. Argente is a founder of the League and director of the review.

The book was published in two volumes, in both paper and cloth bindings, by the Economic Philosophy Library as the ninety-sixth and ninety-seventh titles on its list. The same publisher had announced as its next publication a Spanish translation of Henry George's "The Perplexed Philosopher".

FIRST CLASS TO OPEN IN GLASGOW

GLASGOW (HGNS) - The first Glasgow class is scheduled to open Friday, November 6, according to an announcement in Land and Liberty. A correspondence course that will follow the exact lines of the manual will be offered for the benefit of students in remote places who otherwise would be unable to take the course in Progress and Poverty.
