

CLASS WORK IN PHILADELPHIA EXPANDING

PHILADELPHIA, PA. (HGNS) - A Circularizing of 3000 professional names resulted in 53 students enrolling to form the newest class of the Philadelphia Extension of the Henry George School of Social Science, which held the first session on February 16 in the Social Service Building.

Fourteen of the registrants are secretaries and office workers, 8 lawyers, 8 clergymen, 8 social workers and 15 are engaged in other miscellaneous occupations.

Julian P. Kickok, Extension Secretary, has ordered an additional supply of 3000 triple postcard announcements from National Headquarters.

"Already there is a call for another class to start after the close of our present Thursday course," reports Mr. Hickok. "We are now planning a class to start on Thursday, April 1, continuing until June 3, in the Social Service Building. We plan on circularizing more lawyers and about 2000 teachers. We expect to use the list of teachers available through the Philadelphia Board of Education."

TWO MORE EXTENSION CLASSES for METROPOLITAN NEW YORK

NEW YORK (HGNS) - Llewellyn Ransom, secretary of the League for Progress visited the Henry George School of Social Science, 211 West 79th Street, and made arrangements to open an extension class under the auspices of the League at its headquarters, 228 Lenox Avenue. The class will start Thursday evening, March 18. An instructor has not yet been appointed.

Mr. Ransom first heard about the extension courses of the Henry George School from Mrs. Emma Shields Penn, Education Director of the 137th Street Branch of the Y.W.C.A.

Another extension class will open on Friday, March 5, at the 137th Street Branch of the Y.W.C.A., with Mrs. Eva L. Maxwell, of the teaching staff of the Henry George School, as the instructor.

This will bring the total number of extension classes in the metropolitan area of New York to nine.

STANLEY SUCCEEDS HAYES AS EXTENSION SECRETARY IN WATERBURY

WATERBURY, CONN. (HGNS) - Everett M. Stanley, a graduate of the class of Prof. Bernard M. Allen last spring has succeeded Dr. Royal E.S. Hayes as secretary of the Waterbury Extension of the Henry George School of Social Science. Severe pressure of professional work caused Dr. Hayes to resign after two years of service.

Prof. Allen is now teaching the extension course under the auspices of the Waterbury Y.M.C.A.

TEACHERS MANUAL TO BE TRANSLATED INTO SPANISH

NEW YORK (HGNS) - As a mark of his confidence in the program of the Henry George School of Social Science, Senor J.A. Reyes, director of the Latin American Division of the Pan American Bureau, offered to make a Spanish translation of the Teachers Manual and act as the School's correspondent with the Spanish leaders of the movement in Latin America, whom he called at National Headquarters, 211 West 79th Street, on Thursday, February 25. Spanish is the language of all the countries of South America, only excepting Brazil where Portuguese is spoken, and in the colonial Guianas.

It is the belief of Senor Reyes that the correspondence course offers tremendous possibilities for enrolling students in the southern continent and developing extension classes around the correspondence graduates.

Senor Reyes first learned of the Henry George School from John Dewey several years ago while on an official mission to study the schools and universities of the United States for his own country, Peru. "No modern American thinker is accorded higher honor thruout South America than John Dewey," said Senor Reyes.

Joseph T. Genço, law partner of Senor Reyes is now taking the course at National Headquarters under Arthur N. Seiff.

MONTREAL EXTENSION SECRETARY TO TEACH ADVANCED COURSE

MONTREAL (HGNS) - John Alexander, Secretary of the Montreal Extension of the Henry George School of Social Science, is planning to start an advanced course in Protection or Free Trade about March 11 and the School has furnished him with the Teachers Manual for this study. This manual is as yet only in typewritten form. A printed edition will probably be ready by the fall of this year.

Lesson assignments and classroom aids for six classes in fundamental economics and details of the correspondence course which Mr. Alexander expects to use in the near future are also being supplied by National Headquarters.

SECOND PRINTING of "THE SCHOOL AND THE COURSE" OFF PRESS

NEW YORK (HGNS) - So effective has the booklet, "The School and the Course," proven as a means for interesting prospective students in the course given by the Henry George School of Social Science, that a new and improved edition of 10,000 copies is now being published.
