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#### ZIONIST SEES EVILS IN LAND SPECULATION.

New York, Oct. 31 (HGNS) - According to Mrs. E. O. Goldfinger, a member of the Zionist Organization of America, the evils of land speculation now so apparent in Palestine are not due to the organization itself but to the world-wide prevalence of the fetish of private property in land.

"One of the fundamental principles of Zionism" says Mrs. Goldfinger, "is that none of its land can be sold or alienated."

"At what cost it is adhering to this internal principle can be realized when one considers the tremendous increase in land values in Palestine since 1882 when the first Jewish colony was established there." Land then was purchased by the Organization for eight dollars an acre. In 1936 the Organization paid as high as ten thousand dollars an acre for land in Tel Aviv, which was built upon bare sand dunes.

#### HENRY GEORGE SCHOOL PROMINENT IN CINCINNATI CONGRESS PROGRAM

The HGSSS will occupy a prominent part in the deliberations of the 11th Annual HG Congress which will meet at the Netherland Plaza Hotel in Cincinnati November 12-14, according to the final program which has just been released. Two whole sessions will be devoted to the School and the problems of teaching.

Lancaster M. Greene, trustee and John Lawrence Monroe, Field Director, will address the assembly Thursday afternoon on the subject of the Educational Program of the School and there will be progress reports from leaders of the extensions everywhere. Joseph Dana Miller, editor of Land and Freedom, New York, will preside. On Friday morning George M. Strachan, Chicago, will open the meeting. Frank Chodorov, New York, Robert C. Bowers, Pittsburgh and Henry L.T. Tideman, Chicago will speak on Practical Pedagogy. There will be a general discussion at the end of both sessions.

The rest of the program will deal with The Single Tax, the Practical Application of the Principles of Henry George, World Peace and Economic Freedom, Organization and Mobilization and Legislative Progress.

The Congress will close with the Annual Banquet Saturday evening, November 14. Mrs. Anna George de Mille, President of the Board of Trustees of the Henry George School of Social Science will be one of the speakers at the dinner. Ed. F. Alexander, Assistant City Solicitor of Cincinnati and extension instructor will act as Toastmaster.

#### KOLTHEK MAKING DUTCH TRANSLATION OF PROGRESS AND POVERTY

Groningen, Hollank (HGNS) - A Dutch translation of Progress and Poverty will shortly be completed by H. Kolthak, who made Protection or Free Trade available to the people of Holland in their own tongue in 1929.

Mr. Kolthak is secretary of the Justice and Liberty Party and editor of the weekly of the same name, and has many years of political experience, having served in the Dutch Parliament from 1918 to 1922 and as Town Councilor of Amsterdam from 1919 to 1922. He became interested in the Georgist philosophy in 1927.

There had been attempts to make land value taxation a live public issue at various times since 1890 but they invariably came to nothing.

In 1931 the Justice and Liberty (Recht en Vrijheid) Party was formed largely through his efforts. In the five years since it was organized it has elected one member to the Provincial Government of Groningen and won five seats in the Municipality of Groningen.

There are no paid workers in the party. Editing the weekly, writing and distributing pamphlets, conducting meetings, lecturing, all are done without compensation of any sort.

#### HALL SURVEYS RENT TAXATION THROUGHOUT WORLD

New York, Oct 1. (HGNS) - Pointing out the first condition for free production is easy access to the resources of nature, Bolton Hall in the American City for August, gives a comprehensive world-wide survey of the limited applications of Henry George's principles of land value taxation wherever this principle has been adopted.

The City of Pittsburgh received \$12,000,000 annually from its taxation of land values, which sum had previously been exacted by taxing buildings, Mr. Hall pointed out. Not as well known as the Pittsburgh Plan is the method of financing the irrigation systems in California. Today 1,500,000 acres of California's most fertile land is operated under a system of land value taxation. Important steps have been taken by the States of Minnesota and North Dakota where a portion of the state expenses are raised by taxes on land.

In Canada, Ontario, British Columbia, Saskatchewan, Manitoba and Alberta the Georgist principle is partially in force, Mr. Hall continued. Denmark, Queensland, New South Wales and New Zealand, among other nations, are collecting part of their expenses from land value.

#### HITS JINGO PROPAGANDA

Washington, D.C., (HGNS) - In response to a jingoistic resolution, "The Creed of National Defense", sent by the women's section of the Navy League, the Woman's Single Tax Club of Washington has adopted an answering resolution condemning 'sabre-rattling under the guise of "defense"'.  
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"We are opposed to the spirit of militarism concealed under the name of 'national defense' because history has shown that instead of insuring peace, 'preparedness' proves rather a source of temptation to see in every disagreement with a weaker nation sufficient grounds for war," the resolution read.

"We are opposed to the enormous expenditures entailed by national defense because of the unjust and unnecessary burden of taxation placed upon the worker, who is deprived of the fruits of his labor for the benefit of the militarist and the armament ring.

"We believe in conserving the precious heritage of liberty which our forefathers bequeathed to us, and in addition to this political liberty, economic liberty and justice for our own and other nations, which will prove an infinitely more potent safeguard against war than standing armies and powerful fleets."

The resolution, which declared that "internationalism rather than 'patriotism' is the basis of permanent peace", pledged the club to the cause of international peace and justice as that of true patriotism and urged the substitution of international arbitration for butchery for settling intra-national disputes, was drawn up by a committee headed by Gertrude E. Mackenzie.
