Your letter of July 5th
in relation to letters sent out by the
Fell Fund Commission reflecting upon
the sincerity of Mr. Purdy in his work
for the Single Tax because of
his friendly relations with Mr.
Koots, who is charged with
running his paper for the benefit
of monopolists, was received.

I have also read the extracts from
the letters of Mr. Eggleston and Mr. Kiefer
which you sent me.

I also read your letter last year
in the "Review" and heard the one
you sent to the meeting of
the Commission read and dis-

passed. I know nothing of Mr. Koste
except the references I heard
made to him at that meeting

As both you and Mr. Purdy have to
