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**MAURICE VAN VEEN,  
AIDED HENRY GEORGE**

Maurice Van Veen, retired secretary of the Levy Company, sign contractors, and a former associate of Henry George, the economist who advocated the single tax, died today at the Sky View Haven Nursing Home here. His age was 92.

In 1905 Mr. Van Veen was active in the unsuccessful campaign of Mr. George for Mayor of New York. He also was a leader in bringing the Australian type of ballot to New York State.

Mr. Van Veen was an organizer of the Commonwealth Land Party and was its candidate for president of the old New York Board of Alderman and for Congress.

He was president of the Master Sign Painters from 1918 to 1922 and in 1949 received the Old Timers Award of the National Association of Electric Sign Manufacturers.

He was a director of the Land and Freedom Single Tax, a monthly magazine, and a former member of the Manhattan Single Tax Club. Mr. Van Veen also was a member of the Fossils and of the Blizzard Men of '88.

Surviving are a daughter, Mrs. Robert Van Veen Peavy; a son, Henry G. Van Veen, and two grandchildren.

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
